WHAT IS SEXUAL ASSAULT?

Sexual assault is any form of sexual physical touch to a person without their consent. Sexual assault can come in many forms from forcing sexual acts upon someone to touching people in places that are not appropriate and is unwanted.



HOW ARE BLACK WOMXN AFFECTED?

With all women, the fear of not being heard and overlooked due to racism and misogyny are factors that influence a victims willingness to report their abusers and share their stories.

STATISTICS

- For every Black woman that reports her rape, at least 15 Black women do not report.
- Approximately 60% of Black girls experience sexual abuse by age 18.
- According to a 2014 study, about 22% of Black women reported being raped and 41% experienced other forms of sexual violence.
- Black women students in various academic settings who reported experiencing rape: 16.5% in a high school sample and 36% in a college sample.
- 32% of Black transgender people report being sexually assaulted while in police custody or jail.
- 13% of Black transgender people experience sexual violence at the workplace.

- Go to <u>Resistbot</u> to learn who your representatives are and receive aid in drafting a letter to your Congressmen, state legislators, and governor.
